IV -- AWARD OF SILVER STAR -- Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and pursuant to authority contained in Memorandum Number 21, Fifteenth United States Army, 4 March 1945, the Silver Star is awarded to the following officers:

First Lieutenant Richard H. Hawkes, 0 525 402, (then Second Lieutenant), 424th Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action from 16 December 1944 to 27 December 1944, in Germany and Belgium. During a vicious two hour fire fight for a hotly contested position, second Lieutenant Hawkes, by exemplary courage and determination in the face of severe hostile fire inspired his men to exceptionally heroic achievement. When the enemy infantry withdrew, the area was subjected to concentrated artillery barrages and attacked by five enemy tanks. Remaining steadfast, Second Lieutenant Hawkes directed his platoon's automatic fire on the approaching tanks, forcing them to remain buttoned up, until supporting tank destroyers stopped them. In the days following, Second Lieutenant Hawkes, despite ever present artillery and small arms fire rendered first aid on the battlefield and valiantly led frequent assaults against numerically superior opposing forces. Entered military service from Virginia.

Second Lieutenant Robert L. Honaker, 02 005 565, (then Technical Sergeant), 424th Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action from 16 December 1944 to 13 January 1945, in Germany and Belgium. On 16 December 1944, when the company counter-attacked a hill, which earlier that day had been overrun by powerful German forces, Technical Sergeant Honaker, inspiring his men by valiant indifference to withering defensive artillery and small arms fire, agressively led the foremost platoon to seize the company objective. On 13 January 1945, when their positions were threatened by three approaching tanks, technical Sergeant Honaker fearlessly led a bazooka team which destroyed one tank and repulsed the others. Throughout this entire period, Technical Sergeant Honaker repeatedly defied heavy fire to reconnoiter enemy territory and to utilize the platoon most effectively, despite fanatically determined enemy opposition. Entered military service from West Virginia.

V — AWARD, POSTHUMOUS, OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL — Under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and pursuant to authority contained in Memorandum Number 21, Fifteenth United States Army, 4 March 1945, the Bronze Star Medal is posthumously awarded to the following enlisted men:

Private First Class Anton J. Sedivy, Jr, 36 958 836, 424th Infantry, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy on 22 December 1944, in Belgium. Entered military service from Illinois.

Private First Class Harold D. Smith, 6 264 236, 331st Medical Battalion, United States Army, for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy on 25 January 1945, in Belgium. Entered military service from Texas.
