The primary mission of the Regiment was guarding; administering and supplying PUTE within the WHITE Area under the supervision of the 106th Infantry Division.

2. In complicate with To # 12 (Secret) 106th Infantry Division, the let Bittalion. 159th Infentry completed the transfer of PECE A-6 at Buderich, Germany, to the 3rd Infantry Regiment on the 1st May 45, and moved to its bivouse area NW of PWTE 1-5 at Sinzig. Germany#

all members of the Regimental and Battelion Staffs concerned with FOY Administration attended a school 2 May 1945 held by the Staff of the 106th Infentry Division. Instruction was given in PVFE Liministration. Senitation, Military Government, Prisoner Screening, Police Methods and Military Justice.

As the 1st and 2nd Battalions had no regularly assigned mission they were directed to assist in guarding, PEs at PETE 4-2 at Remagon. On 5th May the Regiment affected a physical count of the PVs at 4-2. The total was 166,788 including 313 women. TO \$3, this Headquarters (see Incl.2) assigning missions to all thits was issued 7 May 1945.

The transfer of approximately 40,000 PMs from PMTE 4-2; at Remagon to PHTE A-5 at Slazing was started at 0800 on the 6th of May. This transfer created quite a problem as it involved a movement by foot march for all those PMs: By 1900 the same date a total of 20,000 had been transferred. The stockade at Mazig already had 75,911 Per under control. The problem was further complicated because of the 1190 German youths (15 and 16 yrs of age) and women prisoners that had been received. Separate stockades were completed however which alleviated the problem somewhat.

6. The Regiment was assigned an additional PWTS at Andernach, Germany, effective 8 May 45. This enclosure was in the process of being built and was to be occupied originally by transferring the 40,000 PES then in the enclosure at Plaidt, Germany. The 2nd Battalion was assigned the responsibility for this enclosure, PETE Auli. By 10 May 39.570 PWahad been transferred from Plaidt. Germany to the Andernach enclosure,

7. At 2000 on 8 May the Regiment received a message to the effect that there was a rict at the stockeds in Andernach. The 1st EN, 2nd EN, Anti Tank Co an Cannon Co were elected and moved out for Andernack. This call proved to be false clarm and the alert was called off at 2130. In anticipation that there may be similar calls in the future, the Regimental Commander directed that there be an established Regimental Alert Procedure. Generally this Plan as published (see inclosure #3) indicates the organization of an "Alert Riot Team" within the Organization of each enclosure, and two Walert Riot Companies Within the Regimental Areas (WHITE) INDACCIFIED 29 PM

- 8. In compliance with Division orders the 1st Platoon, Company *D* 1st EN 159th Infantry departed 8 May 1945 to report to the Commanding Officer 3rd Infantry at Lindfort, Germany. This platoon was assigned for duty to the RHEINBERG PWFE with the mission of supervising the emplacement and operation of eight (8) IMD's around the enclosure.
- 9. The lat BN was ordered to move to Koblenz, Germany on the 8th of May with the assigned mission of administering PNTE A-10. A total of 68,210 PNs were received at this enclosure by transfer of PWs from PNTEs at A-2 and A-5. This movement was accomplished by rail.
- 10. Regiment received orders to establish a pool of 10,000 PW laborers for shipment to France. Three hundred (300) PWs were also ordered to be transferred to the 15th Army. On the 7th May the 105th Infantry Division directed that 5,000 PW laborers be evacuated to Champagne, France from PWTE A-5. This destination was later changed to Bolbec, France. This movement was accomplished by rail.
