

Medal Given Capt. Huddy

Forty Fort Man to Leave for Korea

Capt. Donald C. Huddy, son of Mrs. R. M. Huddy of 5 Cayuga Street, Forty Fort, and the late Rex M. Huddy, received the Bronze Star Medal "for meritorious service against the armed enemy during World War 2" at Fort Story, Va., recently. The award was presented to Capt. Huddy by Col. William P. Pope, commanding officer at Fort Story.

Capt. Huddy, now command information officer at Fort Story, received the award for combat service with the 106th and 35th Infantry Divisions in Europe in 1945. He was awarded the Combat Infantryman's Badge at that time. He also holds the Army Commendation Medal, the Purple Heart, the U. S. Presidential Unit Citation, the Korean Unit Citation and the French Fourragere as well as various ribbons for theater and occupation duties.

At Fort Story since June, 1959, Capt. Huddy will depart early next month for Korea. He entered the Army in 1943 as a volunteer officer candidate, attending the first officers' basic infantry class in 1944 in Fontainebleau, France. He served with the 422nd Regiment of the 106th Division and in 1945 was transferred to the 35th Division.

After a brief break in service, he returned to duty with the Army Transportation Corps in 1946 and since has been assigned in Europe, Korea, Japan, Newfoundland and various posts in the United States. He attended Army Information School and Army Language School where he completed training in the Russian language.
