JOSEPH N. GOODWIN PASSES

After a fight much more difficult than any he faced in combat, Joseph N. Goodwin succumbed to prostate cancer, at his home in Glen Ellyn, Illinois. June 13, 1997. His wife Gay and members of his family were at his bedside.

Joe Goodwin, a native of Chicago, like many of us, was selected by his friends and neighbors to enter the armed forces during World War II. He entered the Army, March 18, 1943 and shortly thereafter, took a long train ride southeast to Ft Jackson, SC where he became a member of the newly activated 106th Infantry Division. Joe was assigned to Company D, 424th Infantry Regiment and further assigned within the company to the Second Platoon, under the command of Lt Alden Russell. He was with a short period of time made first gunner within one of the squads and in September of '44, promoted to Corporal. By that time, his Platoon Leader, Lt Russell had been made Company Commander due to a temporary reassignment of Captain Foley.

Later in the year, as the division undertook training in the "D" Series exercises, Cpl Goodwin was assigned to an Umpire Team under the leadership of Lt Claude VanEmeten. As part of the second platoon under T/Sgt Walter Pampus, he participated in the Corps maneuvers in Tennessee. It was then on to Cp Atterbury, IN for additional training and one day, he was notified that he was being released of assignment in the 106th and was to be sent to the European Theater as a replacement in another division, which turned out to be the 90th Division. A large number of 106th, D/424 men were assigned to the 90th Division. (Joe very much later, in speaking to his wife Gay, told her that "He was very saddened to be moved out of the 106th, at the time, but decided God was at the helm." He often told this story to his children and grandchildren.

In the 90th Division, Joe waas to become a Squad Leader, and win promotion to Staff Sergeant. But while doing so, he was wounded twice, hospitalized and twice awarded the Purple Heart as well as the Good Conduct medal. His ETO medal showed four bronze stars. The 90th Division participated in much combat time, and was one of those divisons which was "pivoted" to provide much needed help in the Battle of the Bulge. It was not until later that he found out that their much needed help was to the assistance of his "early days" division, the 106th.

When the fighting was over, and the movement homeward took place, Staff Sergeant Joseph N. Goodwin boarded a Liberty Ship and headed homeward. His ship entered New York harbour and the sight of the Statue of Liberty gave added feeling to knowing that they were back in the good old USA. He boarded a trained which made the grand stop at Camp Grant, IL and he knew he was almost home, that was January 1946.

Later that year, Joe took a wife named Elaine, and this was the beginning of one of those stories that some how was almost duplicated years later in a movie starring Henry Fonda and Lucille Ball, titled "His, Hers and Ours." Only it didn't work out exactly the same way, only his and hers. Joe became an employee of IBM Corp. and one has to wonder if typewriters and computers had anything to do with the number of offsprings? Elaine and Joe produced seven children while living in the Chicago area, and later being transferred to the Washington, D.C. In the meantime, a couple who had become very close friends, were producing six children of their own. Well, it was at the 1996 106th Reunion in Roanoke, VA that the Goodwins, attending for their first time, provided those of us in attendance with this wonderful story. Joe and wife Gay told us that Gay and her husband were the very good friends and neighbors of the Goodwins, Joe and Elaine. Unfortunately, Gay's husband passed away leaving her with six children, and it was Joe and Elaine who provided her, Gay, with the much needed help in those very trying times, coming to her assistance, time and again. A few years later, it was Joe who suffered the loss, when his wife Elaine, passed away.

This time, it was Gay who gave the support to Joe in his time of need. After a period of time of helping each other, it seemed the normal thing to do, they got married, and Joe and Gay collectively became parents of thirteen children.

Joe worked for IBM for 30 years, and retired in 1982 as regional operations manager for IBM's Midwest area office in
