The birthdays of some of our world's great leaders have become days of celebration, even to the point of becoming a national holiday; but none have been so widely observed as the birthday of Jesus, a universal King. Millions will celebrate His birth with a spirit of feasting and drinking for tomorrow we die; whereas, other millions will approach the day with deep reverence for the Divine Son who unveiled the mysteries of His Father, revealing a God of love who assures us we can live forever.

Because "the guilty flee when no one pursueth," sinful man has tried to hide from God. In so doing, man has deceived himself for he has never succeeded in hiding from God, rather, he has covered his eyes with sin so he cannot see God. Jesus came to remove that veil.

Isaiah, a prophet 700 years before Christ, could look into the far distant future and see the world blackened with greed, hate, physical conflict, bloodshed and ceaseless turmoil. He had tasted of the love of God so he knew that mankind would be rescued from that darkness. To that future generation he said,

The German counter-attack against our forces has broken through into Luxembourg and Belgium. This is a great surprise to many wishful thinkers who figured that Germany was about ready to fall apart. 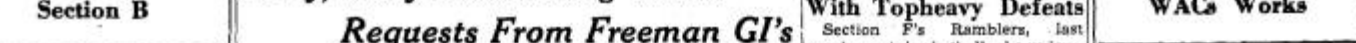
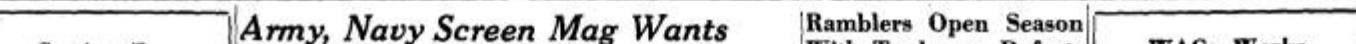
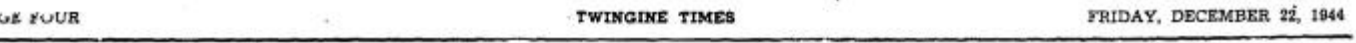
