Staff officers of the 30th Division recently set a few marks for enlisted men and other officers in the division to shoot at on the target ranges.

Brig. Gen. William K. Harrison, assistant division commander, led the group of 18 staff officers in accuracy. With the M-1 rifle he dropped on 16 points out of a possible 210 to register a 194 expert score. He also scored 176 out of 200 with the carbine and 91 per cent with the pistol.

Pressing Gen. Harrison for individual honors was Maj. Stewart L. Hall, division intelligence officer, who fired 192. Lt. Col. Harold E. Hassenfelt, division plans and training officer, and Maj. Robert N. Denny, assistant division quartermaster, also qualified as experts with 184 and 181. Five of the 18 won sharpshooter ratings, while the remaining nine qualified as marksmen.

Demonstrating how the Army can even make mechanics out of musicians are three men in the 3532nd Ordnance Co. here. All former musicians, they are now experts at keeping Army vehicles in running order.

Technician 5th Grade Lawrence Flynn formerly was a baritone singer with Georgia Lang's orchestra in Boston and had a chance for a 15-minute radio spot before coming into the service.
