

## Troops From Europe Arrive

NEW YORK, Aug. 22 (AP)—Four transports debark 2,841 troops today for processing at Camp Shanks, N. Y., and Camp Kilmer, N. J.

The Oneida Victory docks today with 1,077 troops, including units of the 13th Airborne Division; Headquarters 1st and 2nd Battalions, and Companies C, D, E, and F of the 517th Parachute Infantry Regiment; a Military Police platoon of the 13th Parachute Maintenance Company; 13th Counter-Intelligence Corps Detachment; 13th Finance Disbursing Section.

The 335th Ordnance Battalion's Headquarters Detachment; 3225th Engineer Power Plant Detachment; 2841st Engineer Well Drilling Detachment; Mobile Train Unit 200; advance detachments of the 692nd and 811th Tank Destroyer Battalions; 471st Military Police patrol detachment, and four liberated war prisoners.

On the John Hollister were 770 troops, including the 670th Quartermaster Truck Company; 3128th and 3127th Quartermaster Service Companies; 428th ASF Band, and 267 Signal Heavy Construction Company—all with negro enlisted personnel.

The other two transports were the Mexican with 128 miscellaneous troops, and the Phantom Hill, with 13.

More than 14,800 troops returned home last night aboard the giant British liner, the Queen Mary, to receive the noisiest welcome since the end of the Pacific War.

Aboard the liner were units of the 39th Division. Gen. Jacob L. Devers, commanding general of Army Ground Forces, greeted the troops from aboard a cutter at Ambrose Light.

Rockets and flares threw a bright glow across the sky as the liner steamed up the Hudson.

More than 5,000 persons crowded the docks as the Queen Mary slipped into its 50th Street berth.
